Pass It On . . .

Who inspired you to become the creative person you are today? I can remember doing my first embroidery project (little grey kittens cross-stitched on a dish towel) with our housekeeper, when my mom first opened her business in 1954. I was 3 years old. My grandmother was a seamstress in the early 1900's. Grandma would go into Chicago, see all the latest fashions, then come back and sew up special orders for all the ladies in town. I'm sure she taught my mom how to sew, who eventually taught me. But my mom's passion was knitting beautiful afghans, sweaters and mittens. Eventually I learned how to knit a scarf. My best friend's mom taught me how to crochet, and I made my first baby afghan for her first granddaughter. I still prefer crocheting over knitting. It's much easier to keep track of one loop of yarn on a hook, instead of 100 loops on a slippery needle.

During the National Bicentennial celebration, a multitude of needle crafts got re-born. In 1976, I was also a stay-at-home mom with 2 babies. In my spare time, I made lots of crocheted baby afghans. That summer my mom gave me the 3 antique family quilts. And my passion for quilting began. I recognized the fabrics used in Aunt Tillie's Double Wedding Ring as scraps from the aprons she always wore. The other quilt was from the bed where I slept, whenever we stayed at Grandma's house. The third quilt was made by my Great Aunt Margaret and given to my mom when she left for college.

My first attempts at piecing were rather sad. My mom was not a quilter, and Grandma, Aunt Tillie and Aunt Margaret were long gone. Nobody told me I had to add 1/4" to the templates. Even with all my garment sewing experience, it just never dawned on me. I really could have used a good quilting mentor! Unfortunately, that first "pieced" quilt never got finished. But I persevered, just the same. And, as the saying goes, the rest is history!

So, who has inspired you along the way? But more importantly, who have you inspired? Whether you know it or not, I'm convinced each of us has had some impact on someone at some point in our life. Maybe it was your neighbor, or your granddaughter. Or your neighbor's granddaughter. Maybe it

was a total stranger who saw your beautiful quilt hanging in the last show. You might never know. Bottom line is we need to recognize our potential, create the passion, and share the fun. What a difference that might make to the next generation! It's your turn now to pass it on!

Thank you CCQG for giving me the opportunity to serve as your 2012 President. It was a great year for me—I hope for you, too. The passion continues! Pass it on!!!

Hidden Omilie



Cast Iron Singers

The original cast iron Singer Sewing Machine was one of the finest machines of any kind ever built. It was virtually indestructible and capable of performing smoothly for decades. The only flaw it had was a poorly designed bobbin. By the early part of the 20th Century, the Singer company feared it had built it's machines TOO well. They were beginning to be passed down to the children and grandchildren of the original owners, still working fine. The company feared they were in danger of saturating the market. So, they designed newer, snazzier, flimsier models with an improved bobbin design and built-in features that were designed to break in a few years. They then instituted a buy-back policy for their original machines. Once the old machines were traded in, they were hauled out to the local dump and smashed with sledge-hammers to keep them off the market. That's what it took to destroy a cast iron Singer
